

Results of the 2nd U.S. Physics Olympiad for Middle-School Students

Recently, a number of schools nationwide received the exciting news that their students and coaches were among a highly select group of winners of the 2nd U.S. Physics Middle-School Olympiad.

The Physics Olympiad, which was held on March 31, 2022, attracted 1,368 participants from nearly every state. The event comprised two sessions that challenged students to answer questions and solve problems based on current, U.S. physical-science curricula. Olympiad results are shared widely via a variety of media.

Four students shared the First-Place Award for correctly solving all or most of the competition problems:

Their work was notable for some non-standard solutions that showed enormous creativity. In addition, the Olympiad Evaluation Committee issued 15 Second-Place Awards and 40 Third-Place Awards to top competitors. These stellar students, their coaches, and schools are listed below.

The Olympiad Committee not only made awards to 59 outstanding middle-school participants, it made a point of acknowledging every student who rose to the challenge of participating in this national, academic competition – especially since it is in a field that many students find daunting. The Committee noted that participation in the competition was an important academic milestone that provided students with positive momentum for further study of physics, math, and other sciences. Its members also stressed their commitment to continue providing Olympiad opportunities for students.

"We want to keep this positive momentum going and growing, working with schools, teachers and students nationwide," said Dr. Anatoliy Glushchenko, Committee Chair and Professor of Physics at the University of Colorado. "For example, we hope to form a national advisory team focused on proposing updated academic standards for middle- and junior-high school physics education. These updates will help ensure that our middle- and junior-high school students receive physics instruction that meets or exceeds international standards; are prepared for highly successful futures; and that our nation is competitive globally in K-12 science education."

In summary, the 2nd U.S. Physics Olympiad for Middle-School Students was a resounding success. The Olympiad Committee is grateful for your support of this nation-wide initiative. Most of all, we hope that you will continue to share our passion for world-class science education and that, going forward, you will be a part of this rapidly growing physics movement.
